HELPING FAMILIES ACCESS RECREATIONAL PROGRAMMING



We all know that recreational programs are a great way for kid to build self-esteem while developing cognitive and physical skills. Unfortunately, low-income families face multiple barriers when it comes to accessing these programs.


Christie Lake Kids helps families overcome barriers to accessing recreation For a family living on income subsidies through the Ontario Works Program,

they will have (on average) just over \$200 leftover per month for remaining expenses after paying for food and housing (data from Ottawa Insights). Nearly 70% of the families registered within our programs rely on subsidized income for their main income source. More than half (55%) of the families that Christie Lake Kids works with identified that they faced more than one barrier when registering in recreational programs. These barriers can be large obstacles towards their children participating in activities. By working with families to reduce or eliminate identified barriers, we ensure that kids are not denied exceptional recreation opportunities due to economic disadvantage.



One of the largest barriers to accessing recreation is the registration fee for

programs. Statistics Canada data shows that children from low-income families are significantly less likely to participate in organized recreational activities. CLK eliminates this barrier by ensuring that every single program offered, including summer camp, is fully subsidized for participants under the Low-Income Cut-Off (LICO). Other barriers include like **Equipment costs** can also be exclusionary factors. For every program delivered by Christie Lake Kids, all personal supplies and equipment is provided at no charge. For example, our hockey program supplies all children with equipment including skates, sticks, helmets and protective gear; while our camp programs supply extra clothes, sleeping bags, shoes and toiletries. Transportation is another barrier that prevents many families from getting their kids to programs. Few families living under the LICO have access to a private vehicle and even getting children on a bus to recreation centres across the city can be prohibitive due to time and the cost of bus passes. CLK offers community-based after school programs in centres located in the neighbourhoods in which our participating families live. For weekend and summer camp programs, we supply a bus service to pick up kids in the neighbourhoods they live and deliver them to programs.

The children we serve are exposed to higher rates of stress that come with living in a low economic bracket and this can negatively impact their behaviour, thereby creating a potential barrier to participation. Many LICO children lag behind their peers in the development of pro-social skills like communicating their feelings and resolving conflict. As a result, these children are more likely to be disruptive and aggressive. Some recreational programs cannot accommodate for these behaviours, leading to removal from mainstream programs. All CLK programs feature intentional structure to ensure children remain engaged. In addition, our programs have a very concentrated focus on supporting the individual skill development of participants. We maintain high volunteer to participant ratios, and deliver intensive

With the help of our generous supporters, Christie Lake Kids will continue to strive to reduce or eliminate barriers so that children and youth from low-income households can access quality, enriching recreational programs.
